

Identification for Voting

Who can vote?

To be eligible to vote in a provincial election, you must be:

- at least 18 years of age on election day; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of Ontario

What identification do I need to vote?

Electors who are on the Voters List will receive a Voter Information Card in the mail from Elections Ontario with information about when, where and how to vote.

If you receive a Voter Information Card, you're on the Voters List. Bring your Voter Information Card **and** one piece of ID that has your name to vote.

OR

If you do not receive a Voter Information Card, your name may not be on the Voters List. Bring one piece of identification that has your name and residential address to vote.

Visit elections.on.ca to check if your name is on the Voters List.

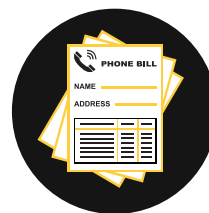
Examples of acceptable ID:



- Ontario driver's licence
- Ontario photo card
- Ontario motor vehicle permit
- Statement of government benefits
- CNIB ID
- Band council identification



- Bank statement
- Credit card statement
- Loan statement or agreement



- Utility bill
- Cell phone bill
- Insurance policy or statement
- Hospital record or document
- Residential lease
- Mortgage agreement or statement
- Cheque stub, T4 slip or pay receipt



- School admissions letter
- Transcript or report card
- School tuition or fees statement
